# Our Mission: Readiness and Modernization for the American Soldier

APG is one of the nation's most diversified military installations and the Army's leading center for state-of-the-art technology. In fact, if a Soldier uses any piece of equipment for situational awareness or to shoot, move, or communicate, chances are an APG organization developed, tested, and fielded it.

APG is home to more than 90 tenant organizations working at the cutting edge of Command, Control, Communications, Computers, Cyber, Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance (C5ISR) acquisition and sustainment; research and development; test and eval-

uation; public health sciences; chemical and biological defense; and personnel security investigations. These organizations are key contributors to readiness, the Army's No. 1 priority, and they are also helping our Army modernize against the threat of new global adversaries.

APG comprises more than 72,500

acres across two general areas separated by the Bush River. APG North, the Aberdeen Area, is a focal point for our missions in C5ISR and weapons and vehicle testing. APG South, the Edgewood Area, is home to organizations focused on public health and chemical

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and biological defense.

In 2018, APG welcomed a special new tenant, the Network Cross-Functional Team aligned to Army Futures Command (AFC). AFC is a major command recently created to streamline the acquisition process and bring our Soldiers the weapons, vehicles, and networks they need to stay protected and win decisively on the 21st century battlefield. Two existing APG organizations were also realigned to AFC: the Research, Development, and Engineering Command and Army Materiel Systems Analysis Activity.

And while APG's workforce has relatively few Soldiers compared to its Civilian and contractor population, in 2019 approximately 250 Soldiers of the 20th Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosives Command will transfer from APG South to the command's new home at APG North.

#### **Explore the Chesapeake Science and Security Corridor**

APG is located on 144 miles of upper Chesapeake Bay shoreline, which is home to hundreds of bald eagles. It is the anchor of the Chesapeake Science & Security Corridor (CSSC), which focuses on forging partnerships with APG to transform our region into an innovation and technology hub. The CSSC was named a 2018 Great American Defense Community, one of only five nationwide. Because APG's workforce is 94 percent Civilians and contractors, most of our men and women live in the cities and towns of the CSSC. In Harford County, APG's home, there are three major municipalities to explore.

#### **City of Aberdeen**

APG's namesake, the city of Aberdeen, is building exciting growth and partnerships with APG. New upscale apartments and housing stock are being added, and nearly \$1 million in improvements are scheduled for the train station. Today, Aberdeen is creating a "Discovery Center" focused on linking our youth with math, science, and technology opportunities at APG. It also recently opened the Advanced Manufacturing, Materials, and Processes Consortium, which is helping U.S. manufactur-

ers use 3-D printing to transform their operations with support from government organizations and the U.S. Army Research Laboratory.

#### City of Havre de Grace

Just north of APG lies Havre de Grace, beautifully situated at the confluence of the Susquehanna River and the Chesapeake Bay. Its residents pride themselves on their city's heritage of duck hunting and decoy carving, as well as its near-miss from being named the nation's capital in 1789, losing by just one vote. Within the last several years, Havre de Grace has constructed an impressive Gold Star Memorial, experienced strong growth in business and residential development, and attracted thousands of tourists and hundreds of new residents.

#### **Town of Bel Air**

Bel Air, to the northwest of APG, is the county seat and a thriving community known as the "Heart of Harford." Approximately 125,000 people in Greater Bel Air, make up about half of the county's population. Bel Air boasts various county and state agencies; regional medical facilities; a historic courthouse district; and numerous shopping, dining, entertainment, and recreation opportunities. It is centrally located with easy access for visitors, while its excellent schools and safe and clean neighborhoods add to its appeal.

#### **Cecil County**

Approximately 16 percent of APG's Civilian employees live in Cecil County, to the northeast of the installation. Cecil County is known for its 225 miles of waterfront along five rivers at the top of the Chesapeake Bay, charming small towns with award-winning restaurants and unique shops, parks with miles of trails, inns, and equestrian events such as Fair Hill International in October and Fair Hill Races in May. With recent expansions by businesses such as Great Wolf Lodge (coming in 2022), Amazon, Northrop Grumman, W.L. Gore, and Medline, Cecil County is also becoming a growing employment center.



### 20th Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and Explosives (CBRNE) Command

The 20th CBRNE Command is the Army's sole formation dedicated to countering the full range of chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear and explosive threats facing the

The highly-technical, specialpurpose formation is comprised of approximately 4,000 Soldiers and civilians posted across 19 installations in 16 states, and comprises 85 percent of the active Army's explosive ordnance disposal (EOD) and CBRN units. Mission command of these highly trained and special purpose forces resides under the Headquarters of the 20th CBRNE Command based at APG.

The command is equipped with state-of-the-art technologies at every echelon to ensure an effective, all-hazards CBRNE capability to identify, assess, render safe, dismantle, exploit, decontaminate, transfer, and dispose of CBRNE hazards, including weapons of mass destruction, unexploded ordnance, and improvised explosive devices.

The 20th CBRNE Command continues to transform to meet the requirements of the nation. The Soldiers, civilians and contractors of the 20th CBRNE Command possess unique capabilities in a highly-specialized field, making it the

single U.S. Army unit for employment against existing and emerging CBRNE threats.

The 20th CBRNE Command provides the Army and the nation with highly trained CBRNE forces that are 'Ready Now' to counter the full range of CBRNE hazards at the operational and tactical level of war.

## 1st Area Medical Laboratory (1st AML)

20th CBRNE (Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and Explosives)

The 1st Area Medical Laboratory mission is to deploy worldwide to perform laboratory analysis of environmental samples at the theatre validation level.

The 1st AML is a FORSCOM field analytical laboratory unit with capabilities to detect and identify chemical, biological agents and radiological materials from environmental samples.

Additionally, the 1st AML can provide health hazard assessment based on sample analysis data, and can analyze samples from natural or man-made events collected during peacetime or conflict activities. When deployed, the 1st AML serves as a countering weapons of mass destruction/force health protection

# U.S. Army Chemical Materials Activity (CMA)

The U.S. Army Chemical Materials Activity (CMA) manages storage of the U.S. stockpile of chemical weapons; assesses and destroys

recovered chemical warfare materiel; supports compliance with the Chemical Weapons Convention; and enhances emergency preparedness in the communities surrounding the chemical weapons stockpiles.

CMA conducts operations to assess and destroy recovered chemical warfare materiel, in addition to maintaining safe and secure storage operations at the Army's two remaining chemical weapons stockpile sites located at Pueblo Chemical Depot, Colorado, and Blue Grass Chemical Activity at Blue Grass Army Depot, Kentucky. In partnership with the Federal Emergency Management Agency, CMA works with state and local governments to implement the Chemical Stockpile Emergency Preparedness Program, which educates, prepares and protects communities surrounding the stockpiles. The CMA director acts as implementing agent, delegated by the Department of Defense, to ensure the Army complies with the Chemical Weapons Convention, an international treaty that prohibits development, production, stockpiling, transfer and use of chemical weapons. CMA also serves as the Army's National Inventory Control Point Accountable Property Officer and National Maintenance Point for chemical weapons

ing these threats medically harmless. MRICD, as the only research institute within the Department of Defense (DoD) devoted to medical chemical defense research, focuses efforts on developing medical countermeasures for nerve agents, vesicants (e.g., sulfur mustard), metabolic poisons (e.g., cyanide), pulmonary toxicants (e.g., phosgene), toxic industrial chemicals, toxins of biological origin, and pharmaceutical-based agents. MRICD efforts are centered on cutting edge approaches to mitigate the effects of exposure by removing or detoxifying chemical threats. MRICD also develops, validates, and implements analytical methods to verify human exposure to these threats.

Additionally, MRICD capabilities include a high complexity clinical laboratory to verify exposure to chemical agents and the Absorption, Distribution, Metabolism, Excretion (ADME) and Toxicity Center of Excellence, the DOD resource for streamlining the screening and development of novel medical countermeasures for chemical and biological threats, thereby improving overall quality and probability for successful drug development.

MRICD's training and education mission is accomplished through three tri-service graduate level courses and specially tailored short courses to instruct medical professionals, first responders, and operators from federal and nongovernmental agencies in the medical management of chemical casualties.

MRICD clinicians and researchers also provide consultation to military and civilian authorities in the prevention, preparation, response, recovery, and mitigation of disaster response to mass chemical casualties.

### Program Executive Office, Assembled Chemical Weapons Alternatives (PEO ACWA)

The Program Executive Office, Assembled Chemical Weapons Alternatives, or PEO ACWA, enhances national security through its oversight of the safe and environmentally sound destruction of the remaining U.S. chemical weapons stockpiles stored at the Blue Grass Army Depot in Kentucky, and the Pueblo Chemical Depot in Colorado.

At each site, PEO ACWA is responsible for the development, testing and operation of state-of-the-art pilot plants employing technologies specifically selected as alternatives to incineration. The two plants are unique facilities, incorporating many processes originated at APG, the center of the nation's foremost chemical demilitarization expertise. The plants are highly automated and make use of robotics to disassemble and safely destroy obsolete munitions containing nerve and mustard agents.

CECOM maintains a global team of approximately 16,000 dedicated Soldiers and Civilians and is headquartered at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland. CECOM will remain relevant, dominant and fully prepared to ensure our combat and support forces have the freedom to reliably operate and maneuver in all environments. We will work closely with military and business partners to ensure our Soldiers have dependable, interoperable and sustainable C5ISR systems—incorporating hardware, software, cyber and electromagnetic spectrum—while operating as part of joint, inter-organizational and multinational teams.

The Program Executive Office Command, Control and Communications – Tactical develops, acquires, fields and supports the Army's tactical communications network – a critical Army modernization priority that brings information dominance to current and future Soldiers and enables readiness to "fight tonight." A simple, intuitive, mobile and hardened network is a key enabler for an agile, expeditionary Army, providing operational flexibility and enhancing leaders' situational awareness in support of decisive mission command.

PEO C3T supports more than 53 key acquisition programs executing more than \$2 billion annually with a workforce of over 1,600 employees. It provides Soldiers with the radios, computers, servers, apps and other hardware and software they require for their missions. It also integrates those systems so they function as cohesive capability sets.

PEO C3T relies on national and regional defense contracting vendors for hardware and software capabilities. PEO C3T turned to small business partnerships for a variety of needs during 2018, recognizing that small business brings innovation and highly-skilled network subject matter experts.

PEO C3T is working closely with the Network Cross Functional Team (CFT) to modernize the network across four lines of effort: Unified Network Transport; Common Operating Environment; Joint Force and Coalition Interoperability; and Command Post Mobility and Survivability. Key Army network modernization efforts include fielding standard mission command hardware and software across all component formations; accelerated fielding of the Joint Battle Command Platform mounted situational awareness and communications system; fielding advanced tactical data radios and modernizing the satellite communications systems. These efforts will enable the Army and its industry partners to evolve the network at the pace of warfighter demands and commercial innovation and to meet emerging threats.

The Network Command, Control, Communication, and Intelligence Cross-Functional Team, referred to as the Network CFT or N-CFT, aligns and nests with the Army's new network modernization strategy. The N-CFT pilot organization stood up to address the most pressing challenges to the tactical network that our Soldiers use on the battlefield. Effective July 2018, the N-CFT was permanently established and assigned to Army Futures Command. The cross-functional teams' mission has expanded to include

Theintegration and synchronization of tactical modernization with enterprise modernization efforts.

The cross-functional team supports the four lines of effort of the network modernization strategy: Unified Network, Common Operating Environment, Joint Interoperability/Coalition Accessible, and Command Post Mobility/Survivability. The N-CFT brings the Warfighters, developers, and testers to the center of the acquisition process through focused integration and disciplined innovation, enabling the Army to deliver leader-approved technology capabilities to warfighters at the best possible return on investment for the Army.

The N-CFT focuses integration of tactical network efforts and ensures disciplined innovation as they work with speed and precision. The N-CFT conducts experimentation and demonstrations of proven joint and special operations solutions, commercial off the shelf (COTS) technology, and non-developmental items with operational units to inform future requirements. The N-CFT consists of professionals from various stakeholders that impact the Army Network community either directly or indirectly. The N-CFT works closely with industry and academia where appropriate to help inform the capabilities development process and to explore what is in the 'art of the possible" for immediate "quick wins" while enabling an optimal future state network.

## **Program Executive Office** Missiles and Space (PEO **MS) Product Manager** (PdM) Radars)

Program Executive Office Mis-

siles and Space (PEO MS) Product Manager (PdM) Radars has been at APG since the move from Fort. Monmouth, New Jersey in 2010. Originally a subordinate to PEO Intelligence, Electronic Warfare and Sensors (PEO IEW&S), it was realigned under PEO MS, located at Redstone Arsenal, Alabama, to provide greater program integration with like technologies and products under the same command umbrella. The product office produces counter-fire target acquisition (CTA) radars that provide the warfighter with a 360-degree protection capability to pinpoint incoming hostile rocket, artillery, and mortar fire. Through a complicated system of algorithms, the systems can also determine the point of impact and locate the source of the enemy weaponry to help direct

counter-fire. Product Manager Radars' mission is to provide the warfighter greater protection in a battlefield where hostile fire can pop up anywhere allowing more moms and dads, brothers and sisters to return home safely.

PEO MS provides centralized management for Army tactical and air defense missile programs. The PEO was established in January 2005 as a result of the merger of PEO Air, Space and Missile Defense and the PEO Tactical Missiles. Beyond closing current capability gaps, the office also aims to stimulate aggressive, proactive capability development and leverage disruptive technologies to meet Army strategic objectives. Within the RCO is a dedicated cell called the Emerging Technologies Office or ETO. Its mission is to directly and continuously align, understand and drive academia, industry and Science & Technology solutions to near-term and emerging threats with development and demonstration of revolutionary new capabilities while leveraging innovation by other government agencies and industry partners.



## Firing Tables and Ballistics (FTaB) Division, U.S. Army Armament Research, Development and Engineering Center

U.S. Army Research, Development and Engineering Command

The Firing Tables and Ballistics Division is responsible for ballistic characterization of munitions and the development of aiming data and ballistic fire control information for all unguided and certain guided combat weapon systems in the U.S. Army inventory, select tri-service systems, and select foreign military sales (FMS) cases. This includes

small caliber infantry systems, mortars, tank-fired munitions, artillery, missiles, and rockets.

FTaB establishes new or updated ballistics technology and designs various live fire tests for new or improved projectiles, propellants, and fuses. Analyses of these tests result in the creation of new or updated fire control input (FCI) information necessary to operate ballistic software and are used to develop tabular firing tables (GFTs), graphical firing tables (GFTs), and graphical site tables (GSTs).

The division produces and maintains operational software used on U.S. fire direction center and gun firing platforms primarily to compute the gunnery solution, and directly supports and develops specific component products of the NATO Sub-Group 2 Shareable Software Suite (S4) and fielded U.S. variants. The NATO software includes the NATO Armaments Ballistic Kernel (NABK), the NATO Armaments Support Software (NASS), the Terrain Elevation Data Manager (TEDM) of the NATO Armaments Geophysical and Information Kernel (NAGIK), the NATO Armaments Meteorological Kernel (NAMK), and the NATO Indirect Fire Appreciation Kernel (NIFAK). Field software requirements are managed through the Army's Ballistic Review Board (BRB) chartered by FTaB.

FTaB publishes electronic and hardcopy tabular TFTs and directly distributes these items to the Soldier in the field. Soldiers and Marines can request TFTs by calling 410-278-0179 or visiting http://www.ardec.army.mil/organizations/wsec/fcstd/ftab/. ## U.S. Army Joint Test Element (JTE)

The U.S. Army Joint Test Element, JTE, provides the Office of the Secretary of Defense-funded enabling capabilities to the Department of Defense joint community by focusing on solving challenges at tactical and strategic levels in joint military operations, and providing operationally-tested, nonmaterial solutions to emergent issues identified by the joint military community.

The U.S. Army Joint Test Element, located at Aberdeen Proving Ground South (Edgewood), is a component of the U.S. Army Test

and Evaluation Command and collaborates with the Joint Test and Evaluation Program. The JTE manages one of three joint test units that support joint test and evaluation projects.

tion projects. Serving as an operational test agency, the JTE enables the U.S. Army Test and Evaluation Command to support Department of Defense operational issues requiring a joint solution. The U.S. Army Joint Test and Evaluation Progran provides guidance and resources for near-term solutions to joint, service, agency, or combatant command challenges. Solutions are tested and evaluated via two options: a quick reaction test for issues that can be solved in less than one year and a joint test for complex issues that require up to two years of effort. Joint test nominations are reviewed semi-annually by a selection board of senior military and civilian leaders who determine which nominations will undergo a six-month joint feasibility study, and subsequently, be considered for selection as a joint

The resulting product of joint tests and quick reaction tests are handbooks; concepts of operations; tactics, techniques, and procedures; revisions to doctrine publications; and training inputs to joint forces and service schools.

# Monitoring bald eagles on APG

#### **APG NEWS STAFF REPORT**

Aberdeen Proving Ground bald eagles numbered 300-350 at any given time; indicating a thriving eagle population on post.

For more than 30 years, APG personnel have monitored, tracked and protected the lively population of bald eagles that reside on the installation.

Lynda Hartzell, a Directorate of Public Works Natural Resources Branch employee, has served as one of APG's eagle gurus, formally known as an eagle compliance manager, for the past decade, during which time she says the eagle population has "really just exploded.'

Eagle nests are counted during aerial surveys by DPW environmentalists and personnel.

These aerial surveys are just a fraction of the work done by Hartzell, her coworker Jessica Baylor, and many of the installation's tenants to monitor the APG's bald eagle population.

From workforce education, to population and nest tracking, to protection and responding to downed eagles, installation personnel work diligently to protect the nation's symbol of freedom right here on APG.

#### **Monitoring the population**

In the 1970s, the APG bald eagle population wasn't monitored or tracked with much detail, mainly due to its small numbers. There was just one documented nest on post in 1977.

"When we started seeing the birds reappear and come back to the Chesapeake Bay Area in the 1980s, we began more intensive surveys in consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service," Hartzell said.

By the mid-1980s, a database of eagle population information was created, keeping tabs on where the birds were nesting and, unfortunately, how many were found injured or deceased.

'We have miles and miles and miles of power lines to support our mission and support our infrastructure," she

"These are big birds; they're not terribly maneuverable with their long wings, and unfortunately they tend to hit the power lines."

By 2002, a spike in eagle fatalities initiated a need to call in the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS). At that time, the bald eagle was still listed as an endangered species and while it was delisted in 2007, it still remains federally protected.

"As a federal agency, we have to consult with the [Fish and Wildlife] service any time there's an activity we think could impact the species, so we did," Hartzell said.

After analyzing information about APG's eagle population and mission activities, the FWS provided APG with a biological opinion, a legally-binding document, which outlined risks to eagles and requirements for monitoring and protecting the eagle population on post, at which point the data collection and monitoring of the eagle population was stan-

Reflective "flappers" that swivel in the wind were installed on many power lines that that remain above ground to make the lines more visible to the birds. According to Hartzell, the combination of line burials and line markers

has "reduced the number of line strikes" significantly.

#### **Population growth and** territory

With countless miles of relatively undisturbed shoreline along the Chesapeake Bay, Gunpowder River and Bush River, APG is an ideal habitat for bald eagles. The birds normally nest no more than a quarter mile from a large body of water, preferably right along the shoreline so they have access to their prey of choice: fish.

Between a species-wide population growth and efforts to minimize power line strikes on the installation, APG's bald eagle population began to grow considerably.

**Injured birds** 

When the DPW Natural Resources Branch receives a report of an injured eagle, they capture the bird- if it is safe to do so. They then personally transport the bird an hour north to Tristate Bird Rescue in Newark, Delaware.

Once at the rescue, the bird's injuries and overall health are

assessed and it receives treatment and rehabilitation. Tristate is also equipped to euthanize birds that can-

> not recovfrom their injuries.

"I think it [the

ability to euthanize] is

very important," Hartzell said. "Personally, I like to know that if nature can't take its course, then we can at least humanely put down a bird that is suffering. To take an adult bird, who has been flying around the bay its entire lifetime and to throw it into a cage....there are enough in captivity for educational purposes. We just like to know they'll be treated humanely."

Eagles that can be rehabilitated are released back into the wild at APG whenever possible.

"We've had several cases where they've rehabbed the bird and given it back to us to release. That's always a good story," she said. "We go pick it up, drive it back here and release it."

Hartzell recalled when an eagle was found on the ground with an electrical burn, an obvious marker of a power-line strike. She said the bird was transported to Tristate where its burns and irregular heartbeat were treated and how after it recovered, it was transported back to APG South and released on one of the

## **Balancing Army missions with** bald eagle protection

While APG is home to shoreline that serves as ideal habitat for bald eagles, it is also home to unique – and noisy – activities that one could assume to be bothersome to nesting eagles.

The U.S. Army Test and Evaluation Command's Aberdeen Test Center operates on the vast majority of the installation's acreage, conducting countless testing operations simultaneously. Many of APG's active eagle nests are located on active ATC test

"You go right down the end of a firing range and you don't even need a telescope; the nest is that close," Hartz-

According to ATC Environmental Engineer David Goad, who monitors the nests on ATC test ranges, the noise isn't disruptive to the nesting eagles.

'From watching how the birds react, the noise itself doesn't seem to bother them as much as you or I walking nearby, because they would think we're there to harm them, versus just a sound they hear," Goad said.

"It's like anything else – you get acclimated to it over time. Some of the birds have been here for 15, 20 years; if you've heard booms for 15 to 20 years

# **Spotting Bald Eagles**

APG Eagle Compliance Manager Lynda Hartzell offers these tips for spotting a bald eagle:

On post, it's relatively easy to spot a bald eagle during the winter months

- if you're outside near the shoreline, all you have to do is wait.

- For installation personnel who don't have access to the APG shoreline, head to Top of the Bay. Not only are there unobstructed views of the bay from the ballroom, but you can stay inside - where you'll be warm and won't disturb the eagles.
- Off post, Conowingo Dam is an excellent place to see bald eagles along the Susquehanna River.
- Regardless of location, early morning is the best time to spot an eagle as they're just coming off their perch and looking to hunt. Immature bald eagles don't have the tell-tale white head and tail, and
- APG's immature bald eagle population is quite large. Look for a bird with brown feathers streaked with white.
- To tell an immature bald eagle and a vulture apart, look for birds with a broad, flat wing shape as they soar. Vultures soar with their wings in a subtle V shape, while bald eagles soar with their wings flat and often flap their wings vigorously.









# **APG Bald Eagle Nesting Season Timeline**

#### **Nest Building: Mid-December**



- A nest can measure up to 10 feet across and weigh half a ton.
- It's common for a nesting pair to build two nests early in the season, and then choose one to lay eggs in.
- Nests are built no more than a quarter of a mile from the shoreline.
- Eagles often return to the same nest each year.

# **Egg Laying & Incubation:** Late February



- Eagles lay their eggs between mid-February and mid-March.
- Usually, they lay one or two eggs. If they're particularly healthy or it's a mild winter, they might
- The eggs are incubated for just over a month.

# **Hatching: Early to mid-April**



- The eggs will hatch in early to mid-April.
- The eaglets will be dependent on their parents for food, warmth and protection for nearly three months.

## Fledging: **Early Summer**



- The eaglets will fledge, or leave the nest, at about 12 weeks old.
- As they prepare to fledge, they will stretch and flap their wings vigorously.
- While eaglets improve their flying skills they will still depend on their parents for food and often don't venture too far from the nest.

#### Independence: **Late Summer**



- The immature eagles continue to grow, developing their flying and foraging skills. By the end of the sum-
- mer, the bond between the adult and immature eagles will begin to fade.
- Immature eagles spend the next four years of their lives developing and establishing a territory. By five years of age, they are ready to find a mate.

you're probably used to it."

Because the eagles have adjusted to the noise level on APG, successful nesting occurs concurrently with the successful execution of APG's test and evaluation missions.

"We are still able to successfully protect the species and do what we need to do as an Army installation. That's evidenced by not only the numbers we're seeing, but the locations we're seeing the nests, right off the test ranges," Hartzell said.

Goad said test schedules are not greatly impacted by bald eagle nesting season. If a situation arises in which it's believed testing might be disruptive to the birds, Goad and Hartzell monitor the eagles closely.

"A high percentage of APG's eagle nests are in our range areas, so we have a vested interest in protecting the nests and maintaining our operations," Goad said. "We keep an eye on all of the tests we're doing that might have any sort of interaction with birds or nests, but for the most part, we can do everything we'd normally do and not bother them.'

Goad said he and other members of the ATC Environmental Division have used cameras to monitor nests particularly close to active testing to ensure testing is in fact not bothering the birds. He said it also provides an opportunity to educate the ATC workforce about the birds ATC goes to such lengths to protect.

"The success of the eagle program at APG is due in large part to the cooperation and commitment of the tenants' Hartzell said. "Stewardship is a shared responsibility. The folks that work on the ranges are particularly helpful with reporting downed birds and anecdotal observations."

#### Impact beyond APG

As a result of a positive working relationship with the FWS and extensive historical data outlining the eagle population and the impact - or lack thereof – of APG activities on the nesting birds, APG has some flexibility in terms of managing and protecting the eagles, Hartzell said.

It's that flexibility that has helped to maintain and nurture a successful population alongside APG's many missions, and that impact is being felt beyond the

"What we're doing on the installation to protect the eagles is impacting birds as far north as Labrador, Canada and as far south as Florida," Hartzell said. "We're having birds come to us from such great distances to either spend the winter or the summer. That's pretty wild to see."

The Chesapeake Bay, the largest estuary in the U.S., provides Maryland residents and visitors with numerous recreational activities. From tubing and kayaking to swimming and fishing, here are just a few examples of water-based recreational activities in the region.

#### **Aberdeen Proving Ground**

APG's Morale, Welfare and Recreation's Outdoor Recreation program offers recreational fishing and crabbing from the shore of APG, throughout the year. State Fishing Licenses are required for all ages 16 and older.

#### **Susquehanna State Park**


Just 10 miles northwest of APG North (Aberdeen), Susquehanna State Park offers countless hiking and bike trails, and unrivaled views of the Susquehanna River dividing Harford and Cecil counties. According to the Maryland Department of Natural Resources, "the park is home to some of the most popular mountain biking trails in Maryland and the river itself beckons fishermen and boaters alike."

Boaters can utilize the Lapidum for a \$10 service charge for state residents. Depending on the season, novice and professional anglers alike can catch fish from the river.

"The annual shad and herring runs in early spring are an awesome sight," according to the Maryland DNR, and perch, catfish and carp are also in abundance.

Because the Susquehanna River, below the Conowingo Dam, is considered tidal water, a Chesapeake Bay Sports Fishing License is required to fish. The park also features a two-loop campground with a total 69 camping sites.

Open April through October, the campground features comfort stations with hot showers and pets are welcome. Park hours and fees, trail maps and guides and upcoming events can be found on the Susquehanna State Park website. #### **Gunpowder State Park**

Discover the scenic side of Maryland with a visit to Gunpowder Falls State Park, located in northeastern Baltimore and western Harford counties. Comprised of more than 18,000 acres, the park features more than 120 miles of trails, protected state wetlands, historic sites and much more.

The Hammerman Area, located in Chase, Md., features 1,500 feet of beach and a swimming area on the banks of the Gunpowder River. Other amenities include concessions, picnic areas, and playgrounds. Those looking for more adventure can rent kayaks, stand-up paddleboards and wind surfboards at the boat shop. There is a fee to enter the Hammerman Area; price depends on date of visit.

The Dundee Creek Marina, also located in Chase, offers boat launching, rowboat rental, fuel and a marina store. The Hereford Area, located near York Road in Parkton, features hiking, fishing, canoeing and kayaking.


Spread across more than 16,000 acres in Baltimore and Howard counties sits the perfect place for family fun in the great outdoors: Patapsco Valley State Park.
